MY EXPERIENCE TEACHING LOCAL KIDS IN THE GALAPAGOS: IMPROVING MY SPANISH BY TEACHING ENGLISH

My name is Theresa Sieksmeier, I am 21 years old and I have been living on San Cristobal Island as a volunteer for Projects Abroad for the last 4 weeks. I chose the teaching project and was placed in Alejandro Humboldt High School. My schedule is from Monday to Friday from 8am to 12.20pm. I support a local teacher, Lider Mendoza, and help him with his daily classes. As a teacher, you have to work closely with the students, who are aged from 14-19 years old in my case. To help them to improve their English skills, you have to speak to them to improve their oral performance, correct and grade their homework, support if they have any questions (and they do have a lot of questions) and help to teach them grammar. After several weeks, you will recognize that they try really hard and that you really



can change things. Your work doesn't just help the students but you will also help your teacher and they will be glad to have you around. However, it's not too much work! In the evenings, you will find enough time to spend time with your host family and the other volunteers.



Being with a host family is also important because it will help you to improve your Spanish. My host family consists of a mother, three children aged from 9 to 16, a dog and three, or sometimes even more, cats. I've never been to a host family that is as friendly and open-minded as my family here is. The balance between caring for you and treating you as a member of their family is perfect. They provide 3 meals per day, wash your laundry and give you your own room, with a bed, a cupboard and a little table. Spend some time with them and they will never forget you.

In general, the people here are the friendliest in the world. It's normal for them to greet you in the streets, whether you know them or not. That makes it quite easy to integrate. At the weekend, you can always go out with the other volunteers because it is a close community and nobody has to be alone here.

You can go out partying, to the beaches or on several trips together. You can go snorkeling, diving, surfing or zip lining; there are a lot of things to do on San Cristobal! There is no time to be bored. However, if you plan to go snorkeling at Punta Pitt or Kickers Rock, you have to go there by boat. Take care as sometimes the waves are really huge and you can get seasick. That happened to me the first time I went snorkeling at Punta Pitt but it was worth it as I got to see sea turtles, beautiful fish, sea

CARE PROJECT by Jens Gangdal, Norway



I have been working at the care project on San Cristobal Island for four weeks now, and so far the experience has been great! I work at a school in the middle of the city and my class consists of 21 children aged between 3 and 4 years old. My role is that of an assistant to the teacher. I help her to keep the class quiet, to make sure all the children do their work, to eat their lunch and to pay attention when the teacher is talking. I also have to comfort children who fall and cry. She is giving me more and more responsibility though and I feel that my work here is appreciated.

The lifestyle is very different from what I am used to. The children eat

desserts for lunch! Lunchboxes contain popcorn, jelly, chocolate and soda so the children have a lot of

energy! There is never a quiet moment in the five hours a day I work but, then again, it is never boring either.

My biggest fear when starting my work here was that I didn't speak any Spanish. However, I realized that the best way to learn Spanish is with children! None of the teachers speak English so I didn't really have any choice but to learn by doing. By paying attention when the teacher speaks, I have now built up my

Spanish vocabulary so that I can communicate just fine with the children.



My teacher is very creative in her planning for activities for the children. Every day we have different art projects using many different materials. We also go on various field trips. Today we took a bus ride to the other side of the island to look at and learn about turtles.

I highly recommend working at the care project with Projects Abroad on San Cristobal Island. It is an amazing place to live and every single day is an adventure. When you work in care, your day ends at 12.30pm every day so you have a lot of free time to go to the beach, snorkel, dive and take part in all the other different activities that the islands have to offer. CREATIVE ART PROJECT by Jana Meier, Germany


White sand, deep blue water, an amazing view of lazy sea lions and a pencil in my hand while forgetting the time. That is what every artist needs; freedom.
