Volunteer Story— Jula Wagner

" I needed to trust

"I needed to do something good for the people and see what practicing medicine in Sri Lanka is like. I also needed to trust my instincts to stand on my own feet while doing something on my own" with that inspiration, 18-year-old Jula Theresa Wagner, a German student volunteered in Sri Lanka with the Projects Abroad.

Jula Wagner was placed in a district hospital in Nagoda near Kalutara which is situated on the coastal belt of western Sri Lanka. The hospital is considered as the best government hospital in the district. Amidst its moderate facilities, she has gained a valuable experience in the hospital.

Some of Jula's daily tasks included doing ward-round with the doctors, inquiring the patients' symptoms with the help of doctors, assisting the local doctors at operation theatres (OTs) and asking as many questions as possible from the doctors to know more about tropical deceases.

"It was quite different from what I see in my country. But I learned how the treatments are given under moderate facilities. The experience I gained was so unforgettable. The staff in the maternity ward was great, one doctor was giving me "classes"; that is what he calls it and explains a lot!" Jula added.

"It is sometimes shocking to see how pregnant mothers were in labor pain and how much effort doctors put. There was much to observe like surgical cuts, stitching, pressing the belly of the mothers etc. But after all this, it was a great picture to see the mothers taking newly born babies into their own arms" she said with a smile.

Talking about the cultural difference she said, "It was a bit different in Sri Lanka than my country Germany. "She chuckled remembering all the funny moments she experienced in Sri Lanka.



Sri Lanka ranked 10th as the World's Most GIVING Nation

Charities Aid Foundation in London published its annual world giving index last week. Sri Lanka appeared in the Top 20 as the 10th most GENEROUS nation in the world. The index by Britain-based CAF looks at three measures of giving in the past year: donating money to charity, volunteering, and helping a stranger. Sri Lanka has improved on two fronts: volunteering and helping a stranger. The report is based on over half a million interviews con-

ducted by Gallup since 2007, as part of their World Poll survey.
